CGSAV - Return to Play (COVID-19 safety measures)

Practice good hygiene



Stop hand shakes, hugging or high-fives between players, coaches and umpires.



Clean hands on arrival, before play, during break and after play.



Where possible, **maintain social distancing** of 1.5m at all times unless competing.



Avoid touching your face and cover your coughs. No spitting.



Do not touch any other external equipment other than match ball or game implements.

Player and parent information

Spectators are allowed.

No socialising before or after competition.

Prepare/get changed beforehand. Avoid use of dressing rooms as much as possible.

Obey venue staff or COVID safety officer.



Stay home if...

- You are feeling sick
- You have a sick family member at home



Download and use the COVID safe app.

<u>CGSAV BADMINTON COMPETITION RULES – (as of November 2023).</u>

VENUE: CGSAV to arrange the venue for the competition.

FIRST AID: CGSAV will provide first aid for the tournament, to be booked by the Executive

Officer. Each school is ultimately responsible for the first aid of their own

students.

UMPIRES & CGSAV to provide officials. Each team should provide a scorer. Scorers need

SCOREKEEPERS: to sit together each game

FIXTURE: Round Robin with finals as presented by the Executive Officer

SCORE SHEET: Must be returned to central area by the winning team -

AWARDS: Plaques and MVP medals will be given to the winning teams in Junior,

Intermediate and Senior divisions.

UNIFORM: All players must be in team uniforms. No jewellery or chewing gum.

TEAMS Students may only play in one team for the day and cannot rotate between age

groups or 'A-D'

AGE GROUP Students are able to participate in a higher age group, but not a lower one.

Once they have moved up an age group, they must remain in this age group.

READINESS In the event a team is not ready to start the game on time, points, goals or runs

can be awarded based on the EO's discretion

SCORESHEET Winning team will need to bring the score sheet of the games to the convener

table for collation

FIRST USE: First serve, first use and opening serve will be decided by a coin toss

or alternative

BLOOD RULE: Any player with blood on their skin or clothing must be substituted

immediately. Play will be stopped, but not the clock.

CONCUSSION: Any student who has suffered a head clash or suspected of having a

concussion must be medically assessed as soon as possible after the injury and MUST not be allowed to return to play for the rest of the day. A first

aider will be in attendance at each event.

CLASH KIT CGSAV will investigate a clash kit for AFL, and bibs for Netball, Soccer, Futsal &

Basketball.

RED/YELLOW Cards

 A player who receives a red card will receive an automatic 1 game suspension as a minimum. The hosting school, in consultation with the umpires and the CGSAV Executive Officer will determine whether a longer suspension is to be given.

Umpires will be instructed to issue a yellow card for swearing. If a player receives a
yellow card in two consecutive games that they were to play in, that player would
receive an automatic one game suspension.

TIE BREAKERS: Teams tied on the ladder to be separated by Percentage or Goal Difference.

If this does not split the tie, who won the fixture when they played Head-to-Head goes into the final. If still tied, compare scores against the top team. Whoever had the better result goes through. If still tied, compare to the next best team etc, etc.

Scoring – Win (4 points), Loss (0 point), Draw (2 points).

<u>Game Time</u> – Approximately 30-40 minutes depending on the draw. Length set by CGSAV Executive Officer in consultation with hosting school.

<u>Equipment</u> – CGSAV Executive Officer will provide the competition shuttlecocks. Schools will need to provide their own racquets and practice shuttlecocks for the day.

Teams -

AGE GROUPS: Junior 1 team (4 x doubles)

Inter 1 team (4 x doubles)
Senior 1 team (4 x doubles)

Each school's best players should be 'Pair A', the next two 'Pair B', etc to allow teams to be competitive when playing.

Players must play in the same pair (A-D) for the day.

No team rotations to be made during a game.

Rules – (Serve) – Played in accordance with current badminton rules.

- The player in the right-hand side of the court who wins the toss and chooses to serve, serves to the player diagonally opposite.
- If the point is won by the serving team, players alternate serving sides (ie move to the left side for the second serve) until a fault is made or shuttle cease to be in play.
- The server only has one chance to serve successfully. The designated receiver must return service. If that player's partner plays the shuttle or is hit by the served shuttle, a point for the serving side is given.
- If the player serves out of turn or from the wrong service court, the receiving team must call 'let' for a replay, otherwise play continues.
- If the player of the receiving side is standing in the wrong service court prepared to receive service, the serving side must call a 'let' before the rally continues to replay, otherwise play continues.
- Should the sides not discover the mistake and 'let' is not called until after the next service, the mistake stands and positions are left the same.
- If the serving pair loses a point, the serve passes to the opposing team and their score determines which player serves next. If the opposing team team's score is an even number, then the serve is made from the player on the right-hand side.
- If the score is an odd number, then it is made from the player on the left-hand side.

(Play) – If the player serves and puts the shuttle in play, each side will hit the shuttle alternatively until a fault is made or shuttle ceases to be in play. Roof and ceiling are out of bounds. Lines are good. Shuttle can touch the net during play. Rally points will be used.

(Faults) – With serving, these are regarded as faults:

- Striking shuttle higher than waist at point of contact
- Head of racket above hand at point of contact
- Shuttle falling in wrong service court (short, or out of bounds, roof, walls and net)
- Feet of server and receiver not in service court until service delivered
- Player feints or balks opponent during play.
- Shuttle struck by receiver before crossing the net
- Player touches the net when the shuttle is in play
- Player hit by the shuttle when standing out of bounds

Scoring – Each rally won will score a point. There will be one score sheet round per court. When the second pair start play in their 15 minute block, they are to continue scoring from where the first pair finished. This will make it easier to calculate in the end. The winning school of the round will be the team (all 4 pairs) who scored the highest total amount of points in the 30 minute game time.

Example: Killester (pair 1)=30 points, (pair 2)=25 points, (pair 3)=25 points, (pair 4)= 20 points, Total=100 points, vs OLSH (pair 1)= 40 points, (pair 2)= 20 points, (pair 3)= 15 points, (pair 4)= 20 points, Total= 95 points. Therefore, the winner is Killester. If time is called and point is being played, this does not count.

<u>Score sheet</u> – The winning team will need to bring the score-sheet of the games to the front desk (to the host school's designated scorekeepers) after the results have been worked out by the winning school.

<u>Finals</u> – If in the event the scores are tied, one additional point will be played. In the case of 2 teams finishing at the top of the ladder with equal points, then percentage will determine where each team will finish on the ladder. This should be calculated from total points for and against.

<u>Serving</u> – The team who gets the choice to serve first will be decided from a coin toss. (or by another format agreed upon by the individuals).

Division categories – Junior, Intermediate and Senior age categories for Divisions 1, 2 & 3.

<u>Finals</u> – If in the event the scores are tied, the team with the most aces wins. In the case of 2 teams finishing at the top of the ladder with equal points, then percentage will determine where each team will finish on the ladder. This should be calculated from total points for and against.

<u>Serving</u> – The team who gets the choice to serve first will be decided from a coin toss. (or by another format agreed upon by the individuals).

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Child Safety - Code of Conduct

Safeguarding Children and Young People at CGSAV Events Code of Conduct CGSAV – Catholic Girls Sports Association of Vic

The Catholic Girls Sports Association of Vic (CGSAV) provides the opportunity for students of member Colleges

- to enjoy and experience sport through representing their school,
- to strive for their personal best through individual and team based competition,
- to feel valued, make new friends and social connections, develop a sense of self through mastery of skill and involvement in teams
- to improve their physical fitness, health and well being

Through the participation in sport within CGSAV we aim to

develop:

- · sportsmanship, including the ability to win with modesty, lose with dignity and accept decisions
- interpersonal skills, where students learn appropriate communication skills and behaviours within their team and towards their opposition
- suitable competitions that allow for new skills and/or refine already existing skills
- students develop a connectedness to their own College and develop friendships/ connections with students from other associated Colleges
- students develop a sense of pride through representing themselves and their College out in the community
- a range of students develop leadership skills
- staff have an opportunity to interact with students in a positive manner.

Purpose

This Code of Conduct has a specific focus on safeguarding children and young people at **CGSAV Events** against sexual, physical, psychological and emotional abuse or neglect. It is intended to complement other professional and/or occupational codes.

All staff, volunteers, contractors, and board/school council members at **CGSAV** are expected to actively contribute to a school sporting association culture that respects the dignity of its members and affirms the Gospel values of love, care for others, compassion and justice. They are required to observe child safe principles and expectations for appropriate behaviour towards and in the company of children, as noted below.

Acceptable behaviours

All staff, volunteers, contractors, visitors, parents/guardians and board/school council members are responsible for supporting the safety of children within our association by:

- adhering to the CGSAV Child Safety Policy and upholding the associations commitment to child safety at all times
- taking all reasonable steps to protect the young people at our events from abuse
- treating everyone in the SCSA community with respect, modelling positive and respectful relationships and acting in manner that sustain a safe and positive environment
- · promoting the cultural safety, participation and empowerment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people
- promoting the cultural safety participation and empowerment of young people with culturally and /or linguistically diverse backgrounds
- promoting the safety, participation and empowerment of young people with a disability

Child Safety Code of Conduct November 2016

- if an allegation of child abuse is made, ensuring as quickly as possible that the young person/people are safe in accordance with the CGSAV Child Safety Policy
- ensuring that this Code of Conduct is followed in any interactions with students from every associated member school
 of SCSA when attending any SCSA event

Unacceptable behaviours

All staff, volunteers, contractors, visitors, parents/guardians and board/school council members must NOT:

- exhibit behaviours with young people which may be construed as unnecessarily physical
- engage in open discussions of a mature or adult nature in the presence of young people
- use inappropriate language in the presence of young people
- express personal views on culture, race or sexuality in the presence of young people
- discriminate against any young person on the basis of age, gender, race, culture, vulnerability, sexuality, ethnicity or disability
- photograph or video a young person without the consent of the parent or guardian
- consume alcohol or take illicit drugs under any circumstances at an event where students are present.
- work with any young person while under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs

Responsibilities in matters of Child Safety:

All staff, volunteers, contractors, visitors, parents/quardians and board/school are responsible for:

- listening and responding to concerns of young people; particularly if they are telling ou that they or another young person have been abused or that they are worried about their safety/the safety of another young person
- reporting any allegations of child abuse as outlined in the CGSAV Child Protection Reporting Obligations
- understanding and complying with all reporting obligations as they relate to mandatory reporting and reporting under the Crimes Act 1958 (Vic) and as contained in the CGSAV Child Safety Policy
- reporting any child safety concerns as outlined in the CGSAV Child Protection Reporting Obligations
- ensuring as far as practical that adults are not alone with a young person
- ensuring child safety protocols at all CGSAV events and venues are implemented
- ensuring risk assessments at all CGSAV events and venues incorporate child safety

All staff, volunteers, contractors, visitors, parents/quardians and board/school must NOT:

- ignore or disregard any suspected or disclosed child abuse
- put young people at risk of abuse
- initiate unnecessary physical contact with a young person or do things of a personal nature that a young person can do for themselves, such as toileting or changing clothes
- exchange personal contact details such as phone number, social networking sites or personal email addresses with a young person

Code of conduct for Coaches/ Officials/ Players.

The following information has been adapted form the Australian Sports Commission document – Code of Conduct.

Official Code of Behaviour

In your role as an official appointed by your school ,you must :

- 1. Place the safety and welfare of the players/participants above all else.
- 2. Accept responsibility for all actions taken.
- 3. Be impartial.
- 4. Avoid any situation which may lead to a conflict of interest.
- 5. Be courteous, respectful and open to discussion and interaction.
- 6. Value the individual in sport.

Coach Code of Behaviour

In your role as a coach appointed by the school, as the Coach you:

- Do not tolerate acts of aggression.
- 2. Provide feedback to players and other participants in a manner sensitive to their needs. Avoid overly negative feedback.
- 3. Recognise players' rights to consult with other coaches and advisers. Cooperate fully with other specialists (for example, first aiders doctors and physiotherapists).
- 4. Treat all players fairly within the context of their sporting activities, regardless of gender, race, place of origin, athletic potential, colour, sexual orientation, religion, political beliefs, socio-economic status and other conditions.
- 5. Encourage and facilitate players' independence and responsibility for their own behaviour, performance, decisions and actions.
- 6. Involve the players in decisions that affect them.
- 7. Encourage players to respect one another and to expect respect for their worth as individuals regardless of their level of play.
- 8. Ensure any physical contact with players is appropriate to the situation and necessary for the player's skill development.
- 9. Be acutely aware of the power that you as a coach develop with your players in the coaching relationship.
- 10. Avoid situations with your players that could be construed as compromising.
- 11. Do not exploit any coaching relationship to further personal, political or business interests at the expense of the best interest of your players.
- 12. Accept and respect the role of officials in ensuring that competitions are conducted fairly and according to established rules.
- 13. Know and abide by rules, regulations and standards, and encourage players to do likewise. Accept both the letter and the spirit of the rules.

Player Code of Behaviour

In your role as a player/participant in any activity held by the CGSAV , you will:

- 1. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of fellow players, coaches, officials and spectators.
- 2. Not tolerate acts of aggression.
- 3. Respect the talent, potential and development of fellow players and competitors.
- 4. Care for and respect the equipment provided to you as part of your program.
- 5. Be frank and honest with your coach concerning illness and injury and your ability to play
- 6. Conduct yourself in a professional manner relating to language, temper and punctuality.
- 7. Maintain high personal behaviour standards at all times.
- 8. Abide by the rules and respect the decision of the official, making all appeals through the formal process and respecting the final decision.
- 9. Cooperate with coaches, officials and staff.



INCLEMENT WEATHER PROCESS FOR CANCELLATION

All sport should proceed where possible, in all weather conditions, with the exception of hail, lightning and extreme heat. Weather conditions need to be continually assessed during the playing time. In rainy conditions the playing surface conditions must be considered safe by the responsible staff. Safety of players is paramount.

Wet Weather

Cancellations due to wet weather should be made by 7.00am on the morning of the event (adverse weather conditions - http://www.bom.gov.au/vic/forecasts/melbourne.shtml), otherwise cancellations should be made at the venue.

Lightning and Severe Hail

Where student safety is compromised with severe hail or electrical storms play will immediately stop. In the case of electrical storms play should only recommence if students' safety can be assured i.e. 30 minutes after the last sound of thunder. Should weather conditions fail to improve, the game shall be cancelled.

Thunderstorm (including asthma policy).

All people at increased risk of thunderstorm asthma should:

- learn about thunderstorm asthma and what they can do to help protect themselves during grass pollen season
- where possible, avoid being outside during thunderstorms from October through December especially in the wind gusts that come before the storm.
- have an asthma action plan (if advised to by your GP) and have practical knowledge of the four steps of asthma first aid
- have reliever medication appropriately available in grass pollen season and be aware of how to use it (ideally with a spacer)
- be alert to and act on the development of asthma symptoms as explained in your asthma action plan if you have one, or if you don't, use asthma first aid.
- Check the epidemic thunderstorm asthma forecast during the grass pollen season at VicEmergency
- While CGSAV is the managing body of a CGSAV event, each school should still be responsible for their own students regarding the management of each student's asthma action plans.

Extreme Heat

Cancellations due to extreme heat should be made at the venue if the weather forecast exceeds 34°C, however if the forecast in greater than 34°C the day prior, the event can be cancelled & all schools contacted (http://www.bom.gov.au/vic/forecasts/melbourne.shtml),

Sports Medicine Australia has written a policy on exercising in heat, with reference to The Heat Stress Index or WBGT (wet-bulb globe temperature). The WBGT takes into account temperature, humidity and air velocity and it is considered a reliable measure of the environmental heat stress. A safe temperature level will be set by the SCSA using the SMA policy as reference material. A guideline temperature is **34**°C (https://sma.org.au/resources-advice/policies-and-guidelines/hot-weather/)

Match Results

If a match cannot continue for safety reasons, a minimum of half the match needs to have been completed for there to be a result.

Major Carnivals, Annual Events and Tournaments

The SCSA Executive Officer will make cancellations for full day activities as early as possible. The decision to cancel will be rung through/emailed to each school – from here Parents/Carers will be contacted by each school.

If a cancellation has not been made prior to the start time, it is expected that all schools will arrive in plenty of time for the start of the carnival, event or tournament. SCSA has the right to cancel or abandon aspects of the event at any time when inclement weather makes the activity unsafe.

Inclement weather

During the round robin phase:

If inclement weather occurs during the round robin phase of the tournament, a winner will be awarded if 80% of the games have been completed. If less than 80% of the games have been completed and there is no back up date, no winner(s) will be awarded for that year.

During finals:

If inclement weather occurs after all rounds have been played & before the finals have been played, then the results will be taken from the points & percentages from the rounds to establish the winner. Highest points & percentage will be the winner for the event.

If inclement weather occurs half way through the finals, then the team ahead at the time is declared the winner.
